1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Should include very brief information about who is the target group in which geographic area, what is the problem statement, the project approach and what was the progress during the reporting period.

Target Group: Never-enrolled, and drop-out children. Children who have already been mainstreamed in schools, children in CFG Community who are below 6 years age.

Geographical area- Guwahati region

Problems encountered

Problems encountered are as follows:-

- community people hesitate toshare the information as they are scared that their identity
 might leak out, some community members try to leak out the information of CFG
 intervention beforehand so that the accused escape the charges
- Substance abuse users are more prominent in few communities like Bhaskar Nagar, Gandhibasti, Basistha, Solapara, Narengi, Goshala, Bhootnath etc.
- Some area has organized gang that monitors all the drug peddling, which makes it difficult for CFG team to intervene
- Child marriage and child labour issues are still there in some of the communities.

Child Friendly Guwahati is planning to do a campaign in all 36 working areas. Till now substance abuse was only been attended in sketchy manner. Awarness campaign with District Legal Services Authorities (DLSA) was conducted at Jalukbari area, We are seeking collaboration of our partners including CAN to launch activity in this area of substance abuse. The whole approach

will need trained menpower for effective intervention. Child Labour and Child marriage cases are being dealt with but eradication of these social evils is the ultimate goal. CFG rescue team along with District Task Force are working in collaboration.

Bhaskar Nagar and Bamunimaidam are two of our largest slums. Tuition classes in these
areas are getting affected for last 4 months because of the Arabic classes conducted by the
mosque Imams around the same time that our tuition classes are conducted. The matter is
pertaining to a particular religion and must be dealt with lots of care and sensitivity.

*The classes mentioned here are religious in nature and they do not refer to the academic syllabus followed in schools.

CFG tried negotiating but has not been successful. School Management Committees were informed and they took up the matter too but the issue persists.

- During home visit most of the time in the community fathers of the family were not found and some of the family people were showing lack of interest. Some families could not be visited due to distance and constant shifting of rented room.
- In some of our Centres in Cluster, the student are still found to be irregular in tuitions due to distance and Schools that gets over very late and unable to reach for tuition on time.

Social educators give extra attention to the irregular children whenever they come for tuition. During school visits remarks regarding their performances in schools are taken from the teachers. Before exams or if these children find difficulty in specific subjects, social educators visit their community to help them with their studies.

• Some places lack basic municipality services like water, sanitation, proper drainage system making it difficult for the families to concentrate in education of their children.

We haven't ventured in this direction. The Child Protection Officer of CFG is meeting Ward Councillors of Guwahati Municipal Corporation for the purpose of upgrading Center Management Committees to Child Protection Committees (as laid down in MISSION VATSALYA Under Ministry of Women and Child Development).

Sudden shifting of places by children and parent are common at few communities.

Progress during the Project period:

• Structured Spaces for conducting Tuition classes could be found in the communities and nearby Government Schools. Currently, out of 36 we have 3 rented spaces. 18 schools and 1 college are providing tuition spaces.

• 95 senior students are engaged in peer teaching for class 1-5 in 30 CFG Centres.

Social educators constantly monitor their teaching and the students only cover subject in which they are good at.

^{*}No trainings were provided to these children. This is a voluntary activity. Senior students teach junior children. It is an exercise where junior students benefit from the senior students and senior students also get their concepts clear.

- Children of 19 CFG centres have Library Kits and TLM Kit facilities from Government schools
 giving them access to better reading environment and 17 Centers have Library Kits and TLM
 Kits prepared by Social Educators and Cluster Coordinators.
- 69 children below 6 years of age were admitted in Anganwadi centers from April2022-March 2023. This was an initiative started in April 2022. During CMC meetings discussion was done to hand over the responsibility to the community members eventually.
- Anganwadi workers of GMC, Christianbasti, Birubari, Sarabbhati, Basistha, Pamohi etc actively mobilized community to make them aware of right to education.
- ASHA Karmi (Health workers) of GMC, Birubari, Sarabbhati, Pamohi, Sijubari, Basistha, Gorchuk, Narengi, Machkhowa, Dhirenpara, Panjabari, Satgaon Noapara, Mathgharia etc. Effectively spread awareness on health and hygiene especially on menstrual hygiene among the girls and women of these communities.
- Visits were done to Ward Councillors, GMC Mayor for the purpose of formation of Child Protection Committee; DCPU, ADC, CWC were visited to discuss child rights violation cases. Inclusion of CFG Rescue Team in the recognized list of District Task Force has been initiated.
- Block Elementary Education officer and District Program officer Special Training were met for seeking permission in schools to held tuition classes in the school.
- Visited Inspector of schools

As a result of the meetings with all the officials (Ward Councillors, GMC Mayor, District Child Protection Unit, Additional District Commissioner (Kamrup Metro), Child Welfare Committee), we received their support towards formation of Child Protection. Accordingly, the first CPC was formed in Bhaskar nagar area in April, 2023 andthis process will be continue till targeted CPCs are formed. District Child Protection Unit organized a training program for promotion and protection of child rights in Child Care Institutions in Kamrup (Metro) in collaboration with Child Friendly Guwahati. Rescue of children in need of care and protection have been done in collaborationwith District Task Force headed by the ADC (Kamrup Metro).

Inspecter of Schools of Kamrup Metro, Block Elementary Education officer and District Program officer Special Training were met to get permission for the purpose of availability of rooms in nearby schools. We have received positive results. There are 2-3 schools expressing unwillingness to allow tuition space after school hours even after receiving permission letters from the higher authorities, We are pursuing those schools .

*The meetings have been documented properly.

- Successfully conducted life skill sessions for adolescent children of 36 CFG areas. 5 sessions
 were conducted in Government schools by CFG Social educators and Cluster Coordinators
 where all children studying in the schools were present. It was also an attempt at inclusivity.
 The Cluster coordinators and select social educators received two days session on Life skill
 Training from resource person Mr. Sonal Roshan, Program Coordinator- Youth involved social
 initiatives.
- 3 Day summer camp emphasizing on fun ways of improving numeracy and literary capabilities among children from class 3-5 in all 36 centers were held. The places for the camps could be generated in the premises of Government schools as well as in a college.
- College volunteers could be mobilized in 3 clusters for summer camp.

- 35 cases of child rights violation were reported from 19 CFG Centers in last 6 months which were subsequently intervened by the CFG Rescue wing.
- 13 child rescue operations have been conducted by CFG (Rescue wing) in collaboration with District Task Force (From Oct2022-February 2023)
- 51 children have been rescued in collaboration with District Task Force and rehabilitated after producing them before CWC. After child rescue operations, following steps have been maintained:
- 1. Medical examination (For cases of sexual abuse or physical harm)
- 2. Investigation and collection of evidence
- 3. Presenting the child before the Child Welfare Committee(CWC)
- 4. Temporary shelter of rescued children 5. Assessment and verification of the child's background on the basis of the information received 6. Restoration of rescued children to their parents or in children's home (depending upon the circumstances)
- 2. Adatabase/MIS is made for tracking of numbers and status of the beneficiaries.

CFG Clusters were restructured in February, 2023. We have rearranged the centers constituting the Clusters. Certain factors like no of children, nearness of centers were kept in the loop when clubbing them into Clusters. We are attaching the new Cluster list as annexure.

- Government schools and private schools are providing space free of cost for conducting tuition classes as well as for conducting awareness meetings during this period (April 2022-March 2023)
- Schools and colleges also provided space for conducting summer camps for CFG children studying in class 3-5.
- Government school teachers helped in taking sessions during the summer camp.
- College volunteers help by taking tuition classes and they helped during summer camps.
- Senior children engaged in Peer Teaching to help junior students.
- Club and Individuals providing space for tuition classes.
- NGOs like Helping Hands, JCI Guwahati Path Finders extended their support to some needy families in CFG communities by providing them with some basic household items, food item etc. They also distributed sanitary pads among adolescent girls of CFG.
- Round Table India and Leo Club Guwahati extended their extensive support by a.
 organizing a summer camp for 68 class 10 students of CFG. They also provided lunch
 support during three day summer camp held for children of class 3-5.
- CMC members initiated awareness programs in all 36 areas.
- Leaders of local clubs helped in conducting awareness programs
- Gaonburhas of GMC, Christianbasti, Dhirenpara, and Ganeshpara etc. extended support in conducting awareness programs. They are helping out in the process of upgrading CMCs to CPCs.
- Second officers of local Police Stations in GMC, Christianbasti, Dhirenpara, and Ganeshpara extended support in conducting awareness programs.
- Asha Karmi and Anganwadi workers have helped in spreading awareness regarding children and maternal health and also on education.
- The Mayor of Guwahati, DCPU, ADC, CWC, Ward Councillors of few CFG areas [Ulubari, Sijubari, Panjabari], Leaders of different unions have extended support for safeguarding the rights of children by taking interest in CFG work.

We received their support towards formation of Child Protection Committes. District Child Protection Unit, Child Welfare Committee collaboratively work with us for rescue and restoration of children in need of care and protection.

Ward Councillors of these areas (mentioned here) took the initiative to collaboratively organize Awareness events with CFG regarding protection and promotion of child friendly environment in their areas.

• BBA, UTSAH, Child Line collaborated for rescue purpose of children in need of care and protection.

*We are getting support from Schools (Government and Private) as they are providing us with spaces inside school for conducting tuition classes to CFG children.

College volunteers are assisting in conducting tuition classes (though the number of volunteers is not totally dependable)

As we attempt to upgrade the Center Management Committees to Child Protection Committees, the community members have shown interest for fully supporting us as they need to act in key responsibilities. The government bodies are involved as CFG Rescue wing is operating to handle cases of child labour, child marriage etc. The Additional District Commissioner (ADC) is the main person for inclusion of CFG in the District Task Force. We are receiving support in this regard.

The key responsibilities include prevention of child rights violation issues, exploitation, abuses in the community. The community members were not only present in awareness Campaigns but they conducted awareness campaigns. As a part of the process of upgrading Center Management Committees to Child Protection Committees, they discussed issues related to their communities with the concerned officials and also learnt the reporting processes.

The CMC members are engaged to assist the females of the community for admitting their children to Anganwadis. We took up admitting the children below 6 years into Anganwadis since May- June,2022. Completely handing over the task to the community will take some time.

Out of 89 counseled for enrollment (below 6 years of age), 69 were admitted to Anganwadi centers during the period (April 2022- March 2023. Not all children counseled for admission could be admitted because a. nonavailability of Anganwadis nearby We haven't worked in this area.

- Child Friendly Guwahati in collaboration with Lions Club of Guwahati ICON successfully organized a day long Summer Camp for the CFG mainstreamed children studying in class 10. A total of 68 children from all 5 Clusters participated in the day-long programme.

Accordingly, the first CPC was formed in Bhaskar nagar area in April, 2023 andthis process will be continue till targeted CPCs are formed. District Child Protection Unit organized a training program for promotion and protection of child rights in Child Care Institutions in Kamrup (Metro) in collaboration with Child Friendly Guwahati. Rescue of children in need of care and protection have been done in collaboration with District Task Force headed by the ADC (Kamrup Metro).

Workshop on Child participation was held effectively.

The purpose of this training was to train the participants on the concept of Child Participation and enhance the system and role of Child Parliament formed in all the 36 centres of CFG. The training included various sessions such as Building perspectives on children, Understanding self beliefs and perceptions, Understanding Child Rights, Understanding about the Right to Participation, Importance of Child Participation, Principles, triangles and arenas of Participation, Child Governed Organizations, Leadership styles etc.

^{*}Stressing more on Advocacy was training provided to all CFG staff.

In the front of advocacy, Child friendly Guwahati is preparing the ground for setting up Child Protection Committees at Ward levels. We are involving Additional District Commissioner Kamrup (M), District Child Protection Unit Kamrup (Metro), District Legal Service Authority (DLSA), Ward Councillors for formation of CPCs. This is an attempt at developing community based child protection mechanism which have legal powers. Child Protection Committees are formed according to the Guidelines laid down in MISSION VATSALYA under the Ministry of Women and Child Development.

During this period structured spaces could be arranged for conducting tuition classes for 22 out of 36 CFG areas.

Use of TLMs was higher in schools as observed by our Social Educators.

All 5 CFG Clusters have used library fecilities during the reporting period.

95 senior children are engaged as peer teachers for teaching children of class 1-5.

The ground work for upgrading Center Management Committees to Chld Protection Committees has already been completed.

The government bodies are involved as CFG Rescue wing is operating to handle cases of child labour, child marriage and other child rights violation cases.

Meeting the Mayor of Guwahati and discussing with him the child rights situation was a significant development.

Ward Councillors for Sijubari, Mothgharia, Pan Bazaar, Dhirenpara, Panjabari, Bhaskarnagar, Gandhibasti were met by Child Protection Officer of CFG. They extended their support by allowing us to organise community awareness meetings in community spaces. Two of them extended their support by being present in community awareness meetings.

The DCPU Kamrup (M) could be met and significant discussions took place with her regarding the procedure for getting CFG included in District Task Force for independent handling of rescue cases. DCPU is working in close collaboration with us for rescue and restoration work.

35 cases of child rights violation were reported from 19 CFG Centers in last 6 months which were subsequently intervened by the CFG Rescue wing.

13 child rescue operations have been conducted by CFG (Rescue wing) in collaboration with District Task Force (From Oct2022-February 2023)

51 children have been rescued in collaboration with District Task Force and rehabilitated after producing them before CWC. After child rescue operations, following steps have been maintained:

- 1. Medical examination (For cases of sexual abuse or physical harm)
- 2. Investigation and collection of evidence
- 3. Presenting the child before the Child Welfare Committee (CWC)
- 4. Temporary shelter of rescued children
- 5. Assessment and verification of the child's background on the basis of the information received
- 6. Restoration of rescued children to their parents or in children's home (depending upon the circumstances)

Second officers of Gorchuk PS, Hatigaon PS, GMC PS, Fatasil PS, Paltan Bazaar PS, took initiative to spread awareness regarding Children related laws during awareness meeting organized by CFG.
